Chaplain Corner – Growing up in Small Communities

Greetings Brothers and Friends,

My wife Betty recently shared with me a composition she had created reflecting on her “growing up” years. I liked it so much I asked her permission to allow me to share it with you. Thank you Betty for being the guest-writer for this issue of the Chaplain Corner.



Growing Up

A few days ago I shared a posting about which I felt strongly. Part of the "statement" included returning prayer to schools. One respondent came back with "separation of church and state." This got me to thinking about my own growing up years.

I grew up on the prairie of the Great Plains in small communities in Kansas, Nebraska and Montana! It was a fabulous place to be a kid. My early classroom memories include Thanksgiving and honoring and thanking the Native Americans for the help they gave the Pilgrims. We ALWAYS had a Turkey dinner with all the trimmings for hot lunch. School would release early the Wednesday before so those who were traveling could get away earlier.

Christmas came next with all the music and pageantry that goes with it. Parents, friends and members of the community gathered in the gymnasium and celebrated in song and sharing good will to all. We sang the traditional Christmas carols, Frosty the Snowman and Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer. It was fun. We would adjourn for our CHRISTMAS BREAK.

Easter found schools being dismissed on Maundy Thursday and resuming the TUESDAY after. This was our Easter break. On Good Friday, all the businesses would close about 2:30 pm in the afternoon so as to observe a Good Friday service at the church of your choice. Stores would reopen around 4 pm and finish out their work day.

We had a "church night" every week that was understood that NO school events were to encroach upon it. It was also understood that NO sports events could take place until after 12 noon so as to observe Sunday. No one died from having to wait to have their ballgames.

The Sunday before high school graduation found graduates, their families, friends and members of the community gathered at the gymnasium for a Baccalaureate celebration. This was led by various members of the clergy of the community. We celebrated the graduates' achievements and acknowledged God's guidance and asked for continued blessings. If you didn't want to attend, you didn't attend. No one made a big thing about it.

Graduation was always on Wednesday night a week and a half before school dismissed for the summer. We had a member of the clergy offer an opening prayer and a closing prayer. This was a tradition until someone somewhere began screaming about the "separation of church and state" and you can't do that! To this day I honestly do not understand what the harm was.

I feel sorry for my children and the children of today's world for not having the sense of community that I took for granted. The east side of the community of Baker, Montana, where I spent about 20 years, was hit last weekend [June 11, 2016] with an F-3 tornado. Homes were totally destroyed, many were severely damaged and people were injured. The Rescue Squad and community rallied to see that EVERYONE WAS ACCOUNTED FOR before they went home to their beds. The communities in the surrounding area have come to their aid and pitched in to help with the massive clean-up project. (When we were hit with straight-line winds that took down many of the trees in our area, we saw a little of this kind of caring. It lasted ONE DAY.)

I stand by my statement that we need to return prayer to our schools. I actually believe it is still there hiding in the thoughts of the child who is sitting down to take an important test. I always did.

Think what you want. This is what I believe.

A Gentlemen Stands in Your Midst

Giving honor to God, who is the master of my life, to the Grandmaster, and all present on this glorious day. Make others to know that, always, that gentleman stands before them. "Words we are charged by."

1 Peter declares: You should clothe yourself with a beauty that comes from within, the unfading beauty of a gentle and quiet spirit that is pleasing in his sight.

The Quran declares: A gentle man is pious True piety does not consist of turning your face to the East or West, but truly pious is he who believes in God.

In spiritual terminology, piety is a virtue that may include religious devotion, spirituality, or a combination of both. "Godliness"

Mahatma Gandhi was asked, by a reporter, "what is your message?" he replied "My life. My life is my message."-Profound.

Today I ask- What is your message? Who are you? Who am I? What does our life speak to- in our homes, on the job, in lodge, or in the world at large? What is our message? How are we responding to the challenge of being a gentleman?

In modern parlance, the term "gentleman" refers to any man of good or courteous conduct. It may also refer to all men collectively (as an indication of gender- separate facilities), or as a sign of the speaker's own courtesy when addressing others. We also have a distortion for the term today, which we don't care to bring in the picture.

However, in its, original meaning, the term denoted a man of the lowest rank of the English gentry- standing below and esquire and above a yeoman.

Esquire is a title of respect accorded to men, particularly a barrister or lawyer.

Yeoman, in early usage, is an attendant in noble households. Hence, you may see, for example, a name "John Brown Esq." or "Yeoman John Brown of chambers".

Interesting enough, the title gentleman was never affixed to a man's name as a suffix or prefix. It was never based on his bloodline, station in life of education, vocational skill, or financial circumstances, but speaks to his behavior in his circumstances, and how he "makes others fee;"-

how fits in, blends, and contributes to the betterment of others. In this mosaic or tapestry of delivery we call life. No one can bequeath to you, or charter you a gentleman. No King or President can bestow upon you, the title.

Allow me to reflect on a quote by James II. "I can make many noblemen, but God Almighty alone, can make gentlemen".

And I must tell you, but I am sure you know, how much more difficult it has become, in this world we live in today- where selfish gains seem to be the order of the day. On the trains, on the planes, on the job, schools, business men...

What about a gentleman's handshake? What about a gentleman's word? What about just being a gentleman? A man who is courteous, kind, honest, humble, honorable, thoughtful, cares for others, celebrates other's victories, gives of himself for others, and is always concerned about how he makes others feel.

Well, I am so proud to be a part of an organization that charges us to be gentlemen. Peter, reminds us that "the beauty of a gentle and quiet comes from within."

...and Sarah tells us that gentlemen are pious.

We are challenged to strengthen the path of our acceptance, and let our life reflect the love of God, that the world may be a better and happier place because of "you".

Let even your own solitude, keep company with the gentleman within you. [So when you look in the mirror, you can say-you will KNOW- that a gentleman stands in your midst.](#)

Let the texture of your character make everyone know that a gentleman stands before them.

Let your very life speak in such a way, that all may know the high ordeals for which we stand... because a gentleman stands in the midst. [Let your LIFE be your message](#)

For, much may be accomplished by the force of good example.

So let your light shine before men, so that they may see your good works and glorify the father, who sits on that house, not made with hands, eternal in the heavens.



