#### News from the East

Greetings Brothers, Family, and Friends.

One constant that every lodge must think about, is how do we retain new members when they join. In searching for a possible answer to this, I first thought about the question, "Why do we join?" I discovered that all the answers can be broken down into three broad categories. The first is history. It does not matter if it is family history, such as my dad or grandfather was a Mason, or history of the fraternity and the impact that it has had in shaping America and the ideals held by so many prominent members of society. These members are excited to be a part of something that has stood the test of time and they can be a part of the living history themselves. The second reason is social impact. This category can be the Brotherly friendship between Masons, that sincere affection by which we know we can trust and depend on another person, or the impact that Masons have on their community at large through donations and work. These members are looking for something larger than themselves and an organization that will make them feel welcome. Lastly are the Brothers like me, who joined for the esoteric or philosophy that Masonry offers. The allegory and thought provoking abstracts that can be utilized in daily life and keep the mind contemplating. These members enjoy finding meaning in areas sometimes overlooked and discussing how they can impact a person's life.

So why is it important to understand this? When speaking to new members who leave within a year or 2, a very common reason given is that Masonry is not what they were expecting.

In trying to decipher this response, it occurred to me that if a person joins for one of these three reasons, but is only given the other 2, then they are not receiving the information that they were interested in. This problem begins at the mentor level. If possible, it is best to pair up a new member with a mentor who shares their interest. A Brother who joined for the history gets paired with a Brother who has studied the history of the Lodge or the Craft from its transformation from Operative to Speculative Masonry. A new Brother who was looking for the social gets paired with a Brother who attends every gathering and is usually part of the planning committees. Through better pairing, we may have more members find what they were seeking. While this is not always possible to do, it becomes necessary for the Mentor to introduce his Mentee to a Brother in the Lodge who shares the interest so they can at least converse during the meals before a meeting. This can help stave off some new members from leaving.

While we join for one reason or another, a beautiful thing about Masonry is that we grow in every category. Masonry does not just improve us in one area, it strengthens us throughout. As I said, I joined for the esoteric. This was a comfortable area for me, as it dealt with inner reflection and deeper thought and conversations. I am not a very social person. In fact, I get social anxiety. I have a harder time making small talk then I do discussing the mysteries of the universe and meaning of life. Yet now I can speak with more people unprovoked. I can start up a conversation and maintain it without trying to find an out. I can sit in front of a room of people and speak somewhat coherently. While I joined for the esoteric, I become stronger in the social setting. Likewise, those who joined for the social may find that they find ways that the teachings of Masonry have helped them to grow and become better people. It is by utilizing all 3 categories that we build ourselves up and make better men. "We must cultivate our own garden. Edsel Lawrence Anderson, of Sun City, AZ. Passed away April 5, 2017. He was born in Spencer Brook, MN. On February 21, 1917 to Andrew and Anne Anderson. He attended school in Cambridge, MN and served in the USAAF during World War II. He was self-employed both with a shell garage and towing service in Chaska, MN and moving to Phoenix in 1963, operated a mobile sales tool company throughout Phoenix. He is proceeded in death by his wife Vena, his parents; sisters Elsie, Viola, Dorothy and Eunice and brother Paul, also a daughter Anita Kelty. He is survived by his son Edsel, granddaughter Kathleen Montemagni and great grandchildren Nicholas and Noelle. After retirement to Sun City West in 1979 was active in the Methodist Church, enjoyed wood shop, bowling and activities with the organ and Scandinavian Clubs. He enjoyed his Friendships in his working years and in his retirement and traveled the world extensively with tour groups and cruises. He was made an Entered Apprentice on March 30, 1954, passed to the degree of Fellowcraft on April 20, 1954 and raised to the degree of Master Mason on April 30, 1954



Brother Frank Lindholm passed away on April 26, 2017. Brother Frank was a Mason for over 66 years and had lived up in Cross Lake, MN (just north of Brainerd) for many years. As many of you may know, my new role at work has me traveling over a 29-state territory. This role puts me at the airport at the beginning and end of each week and in more hotel rooms than I can count. During this last trip, I jotted down a few observations. Although every plane is full of passengers looking to arrive at the same place, seats are designated with different status levels. How much you fly on that particular airline and how much you paid for the flight will dictate the level of service you receive. There are First Class, Preferred, A+ Preferred, etc. When you hold one of these status levels, you may be allowed to board early, sit in more comfortable seats, and receive better snacks, drinks and even meals in some instances. The inequity continues when you arrive at your destination. There are some customers that stand in long lines at the appropriate rental car booth awaiting the chance to speak with the one and only customer service rep while others simply bypass the counter altogether. When you arrive at the hotel, the front desk clerk will not only look for your reservation but will automatically review your frequent stay status. At times, Gold and Platinum members receive room upgrades, as well as bottles of water, beverages and snacks. Some hotels are equipped with an Executive Lounge or Concierge Floor. In fact, in some instances vouchers are provided to key customers to be used at restaurants, theatre and more. All of these things are to distinguish frequent loyal customers as well as attract new affluent customers.

I could go on but my point is that the foundation of Masonry rests upon the pillars of respect, integrity and brotherly love. We ask that everyone "check their hat" when passing through the Lodge door. Your title at work, the size of your home, the value of your savings account, political affiliation, and religion are all characteristics that have no bearing once inside the Lodge. ### **BROTHERS!!** Our symbols are here and DONE!!

It's taken some time to get these from an idea, to a work in progress, to finally a completion of work.

Behold! Your Lodge's symbols!

The first one (the one the left) is the embroidered symbol that goes onto clothing. It can go onto any piece of clothing and any color piece of clothing be it, long sleeve shirts, polo shirts, jackets, golf vests and pull overs, cooking aprons, ball caps, stocking caps and even mittons! Don't worry about the red color. That was the Embroiderer testing the design and she used a piece of red scrap cloth.

The second one (the one in the middle) is the gray tone symbol. That one is for silk screening. T-shirts, can cozies and the likes. It was set in gray tone so that the embroiderer is able to set the color(s) to your specifications. Thus you have to pick the colors and would pay extra for the ones you choose.

The third one (the one on the right) is the final completion from the Embroiderer for the temporary tattoos. These tattoos will be passed out at events such as Dan Patch Days (the parade), the Kid's ID program, Bethel and Job's Daughters events. We will be discussing how many to be made/ordered at May's upcoming Stated meeting. The Prices given to me are as follows:

I'm sure that if we order more, there will probably be more price breaks.

We discussed at the last Steering meeting that we will add an additional \$5 to every item to assist the Lodge in any and all expenses. Meaning that if the item you're purchasing an item for \$27, it would be \$32 total.

# **Perpetual Masonic Life Memberships**

Have you ever thought about a Perpetual Life Membership with your Lodge? Life memberships can offer a Brother a one-time or multiyear payment(s) to be made to the Grand Lodge of Minnesota (not your current Lodge) based upon an age factor number that they provide times the current dues rate of your Lodge. Then each year when your Lodge dues cards come out, you will receive your dues card from your Lodge Secretary and no future payment would be required, regardless of what the dues for the year are. The prepaid dues are only good for the Lodge that you apply for, so if you belong to multiple Lodges and want to have a Life Membership with each one, then you would need to submit an application for each Lodge and pay the respective amount.
