## Greetings from the East, Continued

As soon as I began attending meetings, listening to our lines, taking them in and having that beautiful growth of understanding was when Masonry became a permanent part of my life and making change within. It was that slow understanding and transformation that looking back is such a wonderful thing. Being around some of the Brothers that I've come to know, cry and laugh with. Brothers. Good men. Great men! Looking at these men and wondering, "how do I become like them?" These men were so patient, so forth coming, so caring. Magnanimous. That's the word I'm looking for. Magnanimous. That's exactly what I'm looking for. Magnanimous - **Very generous or forgiving**, especially toward a rival or someone less powerful than oneself. What do I have to do become something remotely close to that?

I just reread that question. That's exactly how I felt being within the company of these men? What do I have to do to become a good man? I wasn't sure that I would ever be a great man. I remember fretting on that. You know how when you start a new job, you want to put your best foot forward and make a great impression? That's exactly how I felt.

So, I had the opportunity to get in the Line. I thought at first that maybe doing so would garner that appreciation. I was learning the lines and going through the motions. Again, trying to make that great impression. But it wasn't until roughly sitting in the Junior Warden's chair and then about halfway through the year that I no longer controlled Masonry. Masonry took control of me. It was during the June or July meeting and when I got to the part of, "to call the craft on again in due season that the Master may have pleasure and the Craft profit there by." Instead of trying to control Masonry, I let go and experienced it. It was at that point things made perfect sense. You get out of Masonry what you give. It took me that long, not figure this out, but to understand.

Moving into the Senior Warden's chair, it just exploded into this thing of wonder and beauty. "Harmony being the strength and support of all societies, more especially ours." What a beautiful sentence. A wonderful statement! Twelve words. Twelve words that make such a massive impact if you allow it and try to understand it.

He also came home and raised a family with his wife. He was a great man. My Foster-Dad took in some kid that came from a broken home, taught him right from wrong, the good in the world, what it feels like to have a family and that being loved is a glorious thing. He, also, was a great man.

Am I great man? I don't think I'll ever know. That's for my friends to decide. My wife, my in-laws and nephews. Am I great man? It's not for me to decide. But I can tell you this. Masonry, has made me a much better man! I hate to think where I would be without this wonderful gift.

Remember, there are men out there that deserve this gift and could do many wonderful things with it. But it's up to us to bestow that gift. 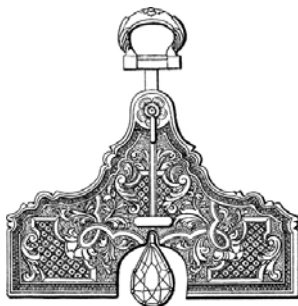

He was born August 14, 1928 in Mannheim, Germany to the late Willy and Paula (Schulz) Kaiser; he has been a resident of this area for 20 years moving here from the Mission Field in Africa. He was a retired Presbyterian Minister and a member of the Hope Presbyterian Church in Winter Haven. Gunther was also a member of the Masonic Lodge in Minnesota, Tampa Bay Presbytery; his pastorates include Spirit Lake, South Dakota and Belle Plaine, Minnesota. He also spent 30 years in broadcasting ministry and mission work in Africa.

Brother Gunter was Initiated as an Entered Apprentice on October 12, 1978, Passed to the Degree of Fellowcraft on October 11, 1979 and Raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on January 26, 1980.

## Key Fob Extender Trick

The transmitters on automotive keys with Lock/Unlock/Alarm/Trunk buttons have limited range because many cars have the same frequency combinations. Sometimes you forget to lock your car or can't remember where you left your car. If you are out of range when you press your key fob buttons, here is a trick to extend the fob's range. Open your mouth and hold the key in front of your mouth with the key end pointing toward the car. Press the desired Lock/Unlock/Alarm button. Your open mouth acts as a parabolic mirror which extends the range. You must be facing the car for this trick to work.
