OES Report

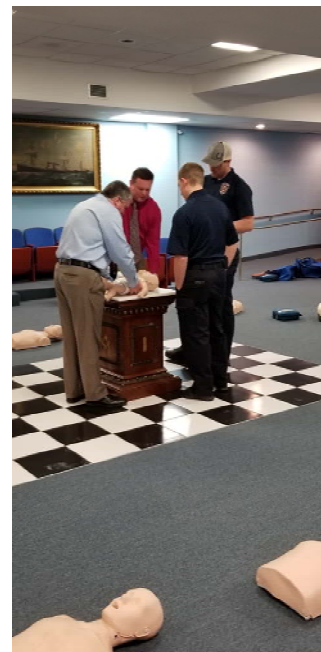

Reiners, Edwin A. age 76, of Eden Prairie, lost his battle with cancer 20 Jan 2018. Ed was an Army Veteran, graduate of Mankato State University, carpenter, CEO of Signal Systems, and Manager at Savage American Legion. He was a past Chief of Staff for Zuhrah Shrine and a member of the Cycle Corp, Mariners, and Steel Drum Band. Ed was also a lifetime member of the Minnesota River Valley Masonic Lodge #6, the Plymouth Masonic Lodge #60, Knights of Columbus and Scottish Rite. He was made an Entered Apprentice on January 27, 1997, passed to the degree of Fellowcraft on February 24, 1997 and raised to the degree of Master Mason on April 5, 1997



Jerry L Maas, age 79, of Eden Prairie, passed away unexpectedly on Wednesday, February 14, 2018. Jerry enjoyed a distinguished career in sales of petroleum products with Amoco/BP. Beginning his career pumping gas in high school and working his way through the Amoco Tower in Chicago. Jerry and Carol lived in several cities throughout the Upper Midwest during his career. Jerry was an avid fan of any activity his children and grandchildren participated. He rarely missed an opportunity to support his children and grandchildren in their passions.
