From the West

Civility is good for our Mental Health

While watching the news the other day, I saw a report that Georgetown University had just finished a survey on civility in our country today. As you may guess, the poll was intended to be a statement on politics and politicians. However, I don't think it's much of a leap to say that a general incivility and rudeness is insidiously creeping into our daily discourse. Airlines, grocery stores, parks, meetings, etc. are often becoming arenas of contentiousness and rudeness.

George Washington, Father of our country and revered Mason, wrote out 110 rules for Civility and Decent Behavior when he was 16 years old. (https://managers.usc.edu/files/2015/05/George-Washingtons-Rules.pdf). Often attributed as original to him they are, in fact, rules that were written for young Medieval noblemen as a guideline for how a man should strive to live their lives. That George would write these rules out and apparently use them as a guideline to his behavior for the rest of his life, may say more about the man than his refusal to "tell a lie", in the cherry tree myth. Here are the 32 that could be considered to be most relevant to today's day and age. Number 14 is particularly relevant to Masons.

- 1. Every action done in company ought to be with some sign of respect to those that are present.
- 2. Let your countenance be pleasant but in serious matters somewhat grave.
- 3. The gestures of the body must be suited to the discourse you are upon.
- 4. Reproach none for the infirmities of nature, nor delight to put them that have in mind of thereof.
- 5. Show not yourself glad at the misfortune of another though he were your enemy.
- 6. Undertake not to teach your equal in the art himself professes; it savors of arrogancy.


- 7. Let your ceremonies in courtesy be proper to the dignity of his place with whom you converse, for it is absurd to act the same with a clown and a prince.
- 8. When a man does all he can, though it succeeds not well, blame not him that did it.
- 9. Being to advise or reprehend anyone, consider whether it ought to be in public or in private, and presently or at some other time; in what terms to do it; and in reproving show no signs of cholor but do it with all sweetness and mildness.
- 10. Wherein you reprove another be unblameable yourself, for example is more prevalent than precepts.
- 11. Use no reproachful language against anyone; neither curse nor revile.
- 12. Be not hasty to believe flying reports to the disparagement of any.
- 13. Play not the peacock, looking everywhere about you, to see if you be well decked, if your shoes fit well, if your stockings sit neatly and clothes handsomely.
- 14. Associate yourself with men of good quality if you esteem your own reputation; for 'tis better to be alone than in bad company.
- 15. Let your conversation be without malice or envy, for 'tis a sign of a tractable and commendable nature.
- 16. Utter not base and frivolous things among grave and learned men.
- 17. Speak not of doleful things in a time of mirth or at the table; speak not of melancholy things as death and wounds, and if others mention them, change if you can the discourse.
- 18. Tell not your dreams, but to your intimate friend.
- 19. Deride no man's misfortune though there seem to be some cause.

- 20. Be friendly and courteous.
- 21. Give not advice without being asked, and when desired do it briefly.
- 22. In things indifferent be of the major side.
- 23. Reprehend not the imperfections of others, for that belongs to parents, masters and superiors.
- 24. Think before you speak, pronounce not imperfectly, nor bring out your words too hastily, but orderly and distinctly.
- 25. When another speaks, be attentive yourself and disturb not the audience. If any hesitate in his words, help him not nor prompt him without desired. Interrupt him not, nor answer him till his speech be ended.
- 26. Be not apt to relate news if you know not the truth thereof.
- 27. Be not curious to know the affairs of others.
- 28. Let your carriage be such as becomes a man grave, settled and attentive to that which is spoken. Contradict not at every turn what others say.
- 29. Speak not evil of the absent, for it is unjust.
- 30. Be not angry at table whatever happens and if you have reason to be so, show it not but on a cheerful countenance especially if there be strangers, for good humor makes one dish of meat a feast.
- 31. Let your recreations be manful not sinful.
- 32. Labor to keep alive in your breast that little spark of celestial fire called conscience.

You never know...



From the LEO

Greeting's brethren! For this issue I want to talk a bit about mentor/mentee relationship and the resources you have available to you. The mentor/mentee process will get out of what each brother puts into it. Regular communication between yourselves and other brothers in the lodge will greatly increase the success of the process and help to build lifetime connections to the fraternity. That said, there are a few things that are available to help the process along.

Firstly, of course, the Grandview site. Upon successfully logging into your account, you should be able to access the "Candidate Learning Center". I've not done this yet (as I was wanting to write this article first) myself, which means all of the material is still available for me to review. Regardless of your level of experience within the lodge, if you haven't gone through the training it should also be available for you to review. For those that are currently going through the degrees, it will only show you the material that is at the proper level. Then, as you progress more will be unlocked. I would highly recommend anyone who hasn't yet gone over this to do so. It is a self-paced process and will help to fill in any gaps you might have from when you were new to Masonry.

Secondly, are the printed materials that we provide to both the mentor and the mentee. If you are a mentor, I would recommend reviewing this material regularly. At least each time you agree to mentor a new brother at each new level they progress to. This will do two things. 1) it will help to ensure that you know what information your mentee is reading and be able to have better conversations, and 2) each time you read something your own understanding will deepen. For the mentee these are a great jumping off point for each of the degrees as they undergo them. But it isn't the end-all-be-all of Masonic learning. Don't be shy to ask questions. If your mentor doesn't know the answer, he will help to find it out.

Thirdly, is the Lodge. The Lodge isn't the building, the furniture, or the lights. That's just where we meet and how we practice our work. The Lodge is the brethren. Each one of us are both the Masons who build and the blocks with which we build our Lodge. We are all here to assist any brother within our Lodge along their Masonic journey. So again, please don't be shy in asking any brother as you seek to improve yourself in Masonry.
