ALL ALONG OUR TRIP WE WERE TREATED TO SOME AMAZING ARCHITECTURE. THE GRAND CHURCHES IN AMSTERDAM ARE AMAZING TO BEHOLD. GRAND PLACE IN BRUSSELS IS AN AMAZING COLLECTION OF MASSIVE BUILDINGS FROM THE 11TH THROUGH 16TH CENTURY. THE SCALE AND STYLES ARE AMAZING. AS I SAT THERE OUTSIDE A CAFE HAVING A BEER I MARVELED AT NOT JUST THE SIZE OF THE STONES BUT THE CLEANNESS OF THE CUTS, HOW NEATLY THEY FIT TOGETHER AND HOW THEY'VE SAT THERE FOR CENTURIES ALMOST UNPERTURBED BY THE PEOPLE WALKING BY.

IN PARIS WE FOUND OURSELVES AROUND THE CORNER FROM THE FRENCH MUSEUM OF FREEMASONRY. IT WAS ESTABLISHED BY THE GRAND ORIENT DE FRANCE WHO IS NOT OFFICIALLY RECOGNIZED BY OUR LODGE. THERE WAS A SPLIT AFTER THE GRAND ORIENT BEGAN ALLOWING MEMBERS WHO DO NOT BELIEVE IN A SUPREME BEING. BUT PRIOR TO THAT SPLIT, THEY WERE CONSIDERED "REGULAR" AND INDEED, BROTHER BENJAMIN FRANKLIN DID JOIN A LODGE THERE WHILST TRYING TO GAIN SUPPORT FOR THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

OVERALL IT WAS A GREAT TRIP AND A LOT OF FUN. IT WASN'T PLANNED AS A "MASONIC" TRIP ALTHOUGH IN RETROSPECT IT SURE SEEMED THAT WAY.
